

Funding Sources for Hearing Aids and Hearing Assistive Technology

The first step when seeking financial assistance is to check with your health insurance provider to see if you have hearing aid coverage. If there is no coverage, then check out the resources below.

• Children

Children may be able to receive assistive technology at no cost if their IEP (Individualized Education Program) specifies that they need assistive technology (hearing aids & FM systems) in order to receive a Free and Appropriate Public Education. • People with low income

People with low income may qualify for hearing aids through Medicaid. A "medical needy program" may provide hearing aids to people with higher income who may temporarily qualify for assistance with medical expenses such as hearing aids. - Prospective and current college students and other people of working age May qualify for financial assistance for hearing aids, assistive technology and other rehabilitative services from Michigan Rehabilitation Services if hearing loss is interfering with classroom or job performance. - Veterans

• Telephone equipment program

Michigan does not have a telephone equipment program.

• Federal or state law requirements

In many situations, organizations, government agencies, educational institutions, and employers are required by federal or state law to provide auxiliary aids and services for communication access (but not hearing aids). Some of these situations are: employers with 15 or more employees, hotels, hospitals, senior centers and residential facilities. Audient Alliance

The Michigan Assistive Technology Loan Fund allows people with disabilities and seniors (or their family members) to purchase assistive technology devices or services. (MATLF) supports the purchase of needed technology through low interest rates and loan guarantees. Loans, which must be paid back. The program is a unique partnership of United Cerebral Palsy of Michigan and Option 1 Credit Union in Lansing. Assistive technology is defined as any item,
